## THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Many of us would remember celebrating the Feast of the Ascension of the Lord on a Thursday. As you now realize this feast has been moved to a Sunday. The short answer is to encourage more of us to attend. I know for some of us diehards, we feel the Church is bowing to the pressures of society, as this is a sign of secular society winning. Will we be forced to move all our holidays to Sundays? What about Christmas? This can be a real and a very understandable feeling, but it can also be an opportunity for catechesis, a moment of personal reflection for all of us.

What demands does secular society make on my time?
How does secular society impact my family?
How does secular society impact my faith and the practice of my faith?
Do I demand of myself that Sundays be kept holy?
Do I spend quality time with family and friends?

The reality is we live in this world, and while we live in this world we also must participate in this world, but the above questions are important.
