





Dear Brothers and Sisters,

The theme of our readings this week is: Redemption, Forgiveness, and Proclamation. The scriptures are filled with passages that illuminate the themes of redemption, forgiveness, and the proclamation of divine truths. Acts 3:13-15, 17-19; 1 John 2:1-5; and Luke 24:35-48 are key scriptures that capture these profound concepts. Through these verses we gain insight into the transformative power of faith, the boundless mercy of God, and the commission to share the Gospel message with the world.



Acts 3:13-15, 17-19 narrates the healing of a crippled man by Peter and John at the temple gate.

Peter seizes this miraculous moment to address the gathered crowd, proclaiming the name of Jesus Christ as the source of healing and salvation. He boldly declares, "The God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, the God of our fathers, has glorified his servant Jesus" (Acts 3:13). Peter emphasizes that the people acted in ignorance when they crucified Jesus, highlighting the depth of God's forgiveness and redemption. He urges them to repent and turn to God, assuring them of the blessings that accompany sincere repentance.

1 John 2:1-5 delves into the role of Jesus Christ as our advocate with the Father. The passage conveys the assurance that even when we falter and sin, Jesus stands as a righteous advocate on our behalf. It underscores the importance of obedience to God's commandments as a demonstration of our love for Him. The apostle John writes, "But if anyone obeys his word, love for God is truly made complete in them" (1 John 2:5). This passage intertwines the themes of forgiveness, obedience, and love, portraying a holistic understanding of the Christian journey.

In Luke 24:35-48, Jesus appears to His disciples after His resurrection, solidifying their faith and commissioning them to spread the Gospel. He opens their minds to understand the Scriptures, emphasizing the fulfillment of prophecies concerning His death and resurrection. Jesus then instructs them, "This is what is written: The Messiah will suffer and rise from the dead on the third day, and repentance for the forgiveness of sins will be preached in his name to all nations" (Luke 24:46-47). This passage captures the core message of redemption through Christ's sacrifice and the subsequent call to proclaim this message globally.

Collectively, these passages weave a narrative of divine grace, mercy, and mission. They depict a God who offers redemption to the repentant, forgiveness to the contrite heart, and a purposeful mission to share His love and truth with humanity. The foundational principles of faith, obedience, and proclamation resonate throughout, inviting us to embody these virtues in our walk with God.

In conclusion, Acts 3:13-15, 17-19; 1 John 2:1-5; and Luke 24:35-48 serve as pillars of biblical wisdom, guiding believers towards a deeper understanding of redemption, forgiveness, and the call to proclaim the Gospel. These passages inspire reflection, gratitude, and a renewed commitment to live out the teachings of Christ in a world in need of His transformative power.

Let us realize our redemption through Christ, let us always seek Christ's forgiveness, and then let us go and share this redemption and forgiveness with the world.



"Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted."

When someone we love has been taken from us, we often find ourselves dealing with change and transition. Many offer their help, but do not always understand the loss we are feeling. Bereavement Support Groups are one way to find support from others who are going through the same process. We cannot go around the grief process, over it, or under it. We need to go through it; we need to be good to ourselves, putting balance into our lives through prayer, reading, resting, relaxation and work. Grief takes time. Unrealistic expectations undermine the healing process.

Our program is six-sessions with fellowship on the seventh week. Our sessions will be held every Wednesday beginning April 10th through May 22nd from 2:00 PM – 3:30 PM in St. Mary School, 45 Crosswicks Street, Bordentown, NJ.

We provide all course materials for the Program, and it is our hope that if you are grieving the loss of a loved one that you will prayerfully consider joining us as our Ministry hopes to help many of our parishioners navigate the often difficult and challenging grieving process. 





RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS By Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman

The Twist Ending

Any reader of psychological thrillers will come across the "dead main character trope" fairly often. This is the famous *Sixth Sense* twist ending (I would say "spoiler alert," but the movie is older than most of the people who work in Youth Ministry at your archdiocese, so you've probably seen it by now) where the reader finds that the main character has been dead for all or most of the story.

I'm always a little disappointed when this happens. It delivers shock value, sure, but it also undermines everything that happens in the story. You've come on a journey with this character, only to find out that nothing you saw transpire was real in the way you thought it was. You feel a little stupid, because the whole time you only had part of the truth.

I suspect Jesus knows this about us. He knows we don't like to have the rug pulled out. It's why he is so up-front about his humanity following the resurrection. See how Jesus, resurrected, shows the disciples his feet, his hands. See how he asks them for food and lets them watch him eat it. See how this creates in them an understanding, a belief.

The humanity of Jesus Christ is absolutely crucial. It's what bridges the divide between the sons of Eve and the God she defied. Our reconciliation with God cannot happen unless human flesh pays the price that will balance the scales. Human flesh: skin that can tear and bleed, bones that can break, a mouth that can thirst, a stomach that can ache with hunger.

The passion and death of Jesus Christ is not a thriller with a twist ending: *he was a ghost the whole time!* The twist, if anything, is this: he was human the whole time.




